

Conor is delighted to announce that, working with local Councils, he has secured government funding for an upgrade of the Wallisdown Road area.

The £2m for Wallisdown Road is part of a £19.5 million funding package

from the regional growth fund will also be used to develop the Lansdowne Business District and new homes in Hamworthy.

The plans will aim to create 4,500 jobs and £200m worth of investment to the area.



The future of the Gas Holders on Guest Avenue and Yarmouth Road are often raised by local residents. For a number of years local Conservatives have been in conversation with SGN, the owners of the site, and planning approval has now been granted to dismantle them.
